


Good Day Gentlemen of the Guards and Dame Raven,

### Afrom the Borders

Many of you have heard me refer to myself as the Warden of the Western Marche. But just what was a Warden? What did he do and what were the Marches? I hope to, by a series of articles, explain these questions, as well as look into the lives of the people that inhabited these areas; their lives, their culture, their relation to one another and the laws that governed and united them. Let me start by saying that Marche is a French word that means "frontier", while Warden comes from the Anglo-French word "wardere" meaning a guard or sentinel. The easiest way I find to relate to this area is to think of the American West in the 1870's.

The Seottish-English frontier is the dividing line between two of the most energetic, aggressive, talented and formidable nations in history. It was a battlefield that stretched from Solway Firth in the south-west, north-east to the North Sea. It was a land dominated by raiders, freebooters, plunderers, rustlers, Border Lords and outlaw riders. Along the central part of this area runs the tangled ridge of the Cheviots, a rough barrier of desolate, treeless tops and moorlands with little valleys and gullies running in every direction. While not high, they are steep enough to discourage travel by horseback. These are bleak windswept ridges of rough grassy turf, lonely in and by themselves. On either end of the Cheviot Range are the coastal plains with their rich farmlands, tree lined valleys, green meadows and rolling hills. These hills stand out as barren crags with names like Foulbag, Bloody Bush, Flodden, and Black Hag. All in all a lonely yet beautiful land.

The border country was divided for administrative purposes into six areas known as Marches, three on the Scottish side and three on the English. Each of these six Marches had a governing officer known as a Warden, appointed by their respective governments. It was their duty to defend the frontier against invasion from the opposite realm in time of war and in time of peace to put down crime and cooperate with the Wardens across the border for the maintenance of law and order.

The Castern Marches were the smallest of the six. Made up of good farmland and with no natural defenses, they afforded the easiest passage with the best forage for an invader as well as providing easy access to Cdinburgh, Berwick or Newcastle. The Middle Marches were something else. They fronted each other across the Cheviot and as such saw the most raiding. As the country was broken, it was ideal for going unseen and for hiding out. These Marches were covered with stone towers and castles that acted as homes for the raiding families and places of defense against an aggressor. It is here that biddesdale, the tlermitage and the Tarras Moss as well as other formidable places are to be found. To the south-west lie the Western Marches that include the Dumfriesshire Plains and the beautiful valleys of the Annan and Nith Rivers. It is the land of the Inglewood and Westward forests. It was also a place of constant feuding and turmoil. It was home to the castles of Caerlaverock, Langholm, Greystoke and Carlisle. The Western Marches were also the location for a tract of land known as the Debatable Land; a unique area with a special place in border history.

Lying within the Western Marches, the Debatable Land was an area some four miles wide and twenty miles long; bordered on the north by Landholm and the mouth of the Liddesdale and in the south by Solway Moss. To the east is the Liddel Waters and to the west is the river Sark. It is a land of green meadows, small hills, and level farmlands bordered by hedges. The land is ideal for the pasturing of eattle and the many nearby rivers make for good fishing. It is divided by a trench and bank that runs east to west ealled Scots Dike. But for all of its beauty, this is a troubled land with no permanent dwellings or villages. It is the refuge for large numbers of border riff-raff and fugitives. Inhabited mainly by Armstrong's and Graham's of both Scotlish and English decent, it is an area whose ownership was disputed by both England and Scotland. Neither country held the other responsible for the activities of the people living there. It was agreed by both that anyone should be free to rob, burn, plunder and kill within the Debatable Land without being held guilty of any crime. It was thought that the only way to deal with the area was simply to devastate it and so make it totally unfit for human habitation. This both sides did frequently to no avail. The Debatable Land remained a thorn in the side of both England and Scotland throughout the period we portray.

## Ambassadors

Prinks All Around!

We're coming up on what have historically been our two hottest faires, Pittsburg and Pleasanton. It wouldn't hurt to review some of the things we need to remember to keep us vertical and functioning.

Of paramount importance is getting enough fluids. How much is enough? A study by the Israeli Defense Force showed that soldiers who drank one liter of water per hour (that is about two pints, or two bottles of drinking water) were able to withstand the rigors of marching in the desert in mid-August, the hottest month in one of the hottest places on earth. A liter may seem like a lot, especially if you try to down it while sitting at a computer in an air conditioned office like I did. Even when the heat is on, and our bodies are buried deep under layers of velvet and brocade, a liter may still be a rather ambitious goal, but ong worth aspiring to. Find out how many times you need to fill your drinking vessel to get one liter. Some good rules to go by are never let your cup go dry during the hot hours of the day. If you find your cup in its hanger more than half the time, you are probably not getting enough water. Also, you should have to visit the privy about every two hours. If you are not, you probably aren't getting enough.

That much water can get pretty tiresome, and it is useful to vary the kinds of fluids you drink. Gatorade is a good choice too, but many kinds of fruit juices are not because of the sugar content. Carbonated beverages are not recommended, as they tend to make you feel like you have consumed more than you actually have. A soda or two during the day won't kill you, but make sure you are pushing water and Gatorade as well. Remember also that caffeine can have a dehydrating effect, but if you are used to drinking several cups of

coffee or sodas a day, it's best not to try quitting cold turkey on faire day. The only thing worse than getting sick from the heat is getting sick from the heat AND having a caffeing withdrawal headache.

Pon't forget to eat! Not just grazing at the health and safety tables, but also getting a good breakfast and at least one substantial meal during the day. If you can't stomach faire food, bring something to have for lunch.

Finally, keep an eye on the people around you. When a person is in the initial stages of going down from the heat, he/she is often the last to know about it. Look for people who are red-faced, or worse still, pale. Notice if the person becomes withdrawn and stares off into space for minutes on end. If you see him or her shivering despite being in full sun in triple digit weather, it might be time to suggest to that person they dress down and rest for a while.

If we take care of ourselves and watch out for the well being of each other, we won't just survive the faire, we will enjoy it.

Reminders to all Saint Andrews Members....

- Viands should be brought to each event to share with the entire guild...this is not bunch, rather viands are snacks that are out for all of us to keep our energy levels up all day. If you have questions on what you should bring please contact Chieftain Heber or your Head of Household.
- \* Heat is always a concern at the upcoming events in August and September. Do not wait until the day of an event to start hydrating yourself...start drinking extra water 4 or 5 days in advance...and never turn away an offer of water at these events! Our Highlanders do an excellent job trying to look out for our health, please help them by helping yourselves to both water and viands ALL day! And don't forget the sunscreen...make sure you put it on as part of your costume in the morning!
- Shade, find it and stay in it as much as possible!! Chough said! :)
- Children while we have a wonderful Children's flousehold, we do want to make sure that everyone remembers that they are not a babysitting service. :) Children's activities are planned, and they do have duties to perform, but it is the parent's responsibility to keep watch over their children throughout the day. inhospitable climate nurtured a tough, insular and contentious people.

A hearty mixture of landowners, tenants and hill farmers, they were as it seems "not acquainted with many learned or rare phrases", and it took a little to offend them. Law and order in the form of central government was far away, and more often than then not when a dispute did arise between them "they expect no law but bang it out bravely, one and his kindred against the other and his; they will subject themselves to no justice, but an inhumane and barbarous manner fight and kill one another; they run together in clangs [clans] as they term it, or names. This fighting they call feides, or deadly feides [feuds]."

Religion, it would seem, did not prove to be a moderating influence on their behavior either. "Amongst these rude and superstitious people even the priest went with sword and dagger" and many border churches were, by necessity, strongly fortified. What religion they did acknowledge was of the strictly practical kind. The Scottish historian, Bishop Leslie, whose history of Scotland was written between 1572 - 76, tells us that their devotion to their rosaries was never greater than before setting out on a raid, and on the Scottish border it was the custom at christening to leave unblessed the child's master hand in order that unhallowed blows could be struck upon the enemy!
