

I look forward to seeing you all at Livermore.



I've sometimes wondered what it would be like to do a faire in weather similar to that experienced in Scotland. At the Calaveras Celtie Faire at Angels Camp this year, I got to find out.

If you weren't there or hadn't heard, we had snow. Not snow flurries which melted when it hit the ground, a real snow storm with inches of snow that remained on the ground the entire day.

There were rumors of snow, eredible enough that I purchased chains for my car. As I drove up to Angels Camp, I sniekered at my worries of snow. The weather was cloudy but relatively dry. Everything looked pretty normal, except for a snow plow which raced past me in the opposite direction. It was then I noticed the first snowflakes on my windshield.

"No big deal," I thought. "We had snow flurries a couple of years ago at Angels Camp."

Then I noticed the landscape was looking awfully...white. So were my knuckles. I was born and raised in California, and I've never driven in the snow.

I arrived at my hotel and found a "Be Back Soon!" sign at the front desk. I crossed the parking lot, the snow covered parking lot, and had dinner at Perko's with Lady Fleming and Lord Duncan. While I had been fretting over the icy roads, a group of hearty St. Andrews members that included Fleming and Duncan had put together our camp. It was the first heroic deed I'd heard about this faire, the first of many.

The following morning, the snow was coming down even harder than before. The hotel's satellite dish was buried so there was no TV, and the faire looked very much in doubt. A group of us had breakfast at Perko's, being served by a skeleton crew serving staff and a single cook. The snow storm that was threatening the faire was preventing the restaurant workers from coming to work. As

we looked out at the snowglobe-like vistas, we got the call. The faire was on.

I went back to my room and hurriedly dressed. Many of us were driven to the fairgrounds by Johan von Plyme, a Tahoe resident who has a lot of experience in driving in snow and an SUV large enough to ferry family sized groups up the road.

The camp was uninhabitable. The Queen's Tent had collapsed under the weight of snow, and the white stuff was piled inches deep on the lawn. We set up an improvised camp down near the gate and did meet and greet with the patrons who decided coming to see us was worth braving the snow and the slush. Cullen shoveled a path clear of snow so people could approach ther Majesty, and the Queen's Guard mustered and drilled with their halberds, even as the snow continued to fall.

I'd heard that people had spent the night in tents and in their ears the night before. I saw people walking around with wet footwear all weekend. And in spite of all this, I saw people doing their jobs, as if it was 70 degrees and sunny.

The following morning, our guild was awarded a Thor's Hammer for its good work in difficult circumstances. On Sunday, the circumstances didn't get any easier. anuthing, it was colder than the day before. I had heard the wind chill factor was 24 degrees, and while we had some snow, we also had hail and rain too. And yet there unsinkable St. Andrews was, doing meet and greet, having dance shows, gigging with other guilds. The previous evening, we had packed up our soggy encampment, so on Sunday we had the unique experience of marching in the ring out parade and then going straight out the gates and home.

I doubt anyone who attended this faire will ever forget it. It was a faire where heroism was commonplace. Not since the fairoaks Inferno of over a decade ago has this guild acquitted itself so well, and I am proud to be a member of St. Andrews.

cs Mary "La Flamina" Fleming 80

Mary Fleming, born in 1542, was not only nobly born, but royal as well. She shared a common grandfather with Mary Stuart, James IV. Fleming so closely resembled the Queen, that they could pass for sisters.

Mary Fleming was given the nickname "La Flamina" because she was considered the flower of the flock. When the Queen was forced to go to France for her safety, Mary Fleming was one of the four Mary's that went with her. Fleming's mother, Janet Stewart, went with them as governess of the young Queen. As the story goes, she did not stay long for she was sent back to Scotland. She had gained the King of France's favor, and was carrying his child (and flaunting it). This did not affect the deep friendship that developed between Fleming and the Queen.

La Flemina was the only one of the four Mary's who would take the young queen's dares and could outdo the queen in mischief. She often shared the Queens bedchamber when she did not want to be alone.

bike the Queen, she enjoyed the games and festivities of court life. The Queen and her Mary's would often dress as boys and sneak out of the eastle to have fun in the shire. They were very athletic and much preferred being on horse back to travel than being in a carriage. Along with the other Mary's, Fleming was educated with Mary. She could read and write French, was taught music, needlework and religion.

In 1564, William Maitland courted Fleming. When the Queen gave her blessing, they married on January 6, 1566. They had one son, James, and a daughter, Margaret. In 1573, Fleming became a widow when Maitland committed suicide prior to the fall of Edinburgh castle.

James Hepburn, the 4th Carl of Bothwell, has written a rather sensitive missive to James Stewart, the Carl of Moray and half brother to our Sovereign. An unknown seoundrel has intercepted the missive and has posted it here for all to see.

James Stewart, Earl of Moray ~

Good Sir, as a servant of Her Majesty I have become increasingly concerned about Her Majesty's welfare and security. We are both well aware that as a Papist Her Majesty follows the teaching of the Pope and that Her devotion to Her faith is of great concern for many in Scotland. As with ye and I, the majority of Scotland are Reformists, the one true faith. Many are concerned that Her Majesty will force the realm to follow Her beliefs.
