### AFrom the Borders, Part III, The Marche Wardense

Alt the center of the law and order on the Scottish, English Borders were the Marche Wardens. These were six in number, three on each side of the frontier governing their respective East, Middle and Western Marches. Their duties were officially to guard the frontier, confer with their opposite warden regularly for the good government of their respective areas, to appoint subordinate officials, supervise and keep in repair the strongholds, suppress crime, give and obtain redress against offenders, pursue fugitives and hold domestic as well as international courts. In other words they were to administer the law of the land. In times of war they were responsible for mustering the Marche men for the defense of the land and leading them into battle. To be effective in this the Warden had to be a mixture of soldier, judge, lawyer, fighting-man, diplomat, politician, rough-rider, detective, administrator and intelligence agent.

For this he was paid the princely sum of 20 pounds sterling a year on the Scottish side and 300 to 1100 pounds sterling a year on the English. In spite of the pay the job of Warden was desirable in that it offered opportunities of enrichment and power. As officially the Master of the Marche, a Warden could use his office to establish himself financially and secure his family and property against his enemies. The office was not officially a hereditary one, but on the Scottish side at least it tended to reside with the same families. The difference between the Scottish and the English appointment policies was a vital one. The Scottish Wardens were local men, because the government knew that they knew the area, the people, their ways and customs. It was like setting a thief to catch a thief. If they could not keep order, who could? The downside to this was that they were often involved in local feuds and alliances and tended to favor their own faction whether it be blood ties, tenants or followers.

The English Wardens in contrast were political appointees, not local men and therefore had no ties to the land or the people. They were ignorant in all respects and were resented as outsiders by the people. They were also hampered by a central authority where support was unpredictable. They seldom received the trust, backing or financial aid from London that they needed to do their job effectively. The Wardens were there in theory for the good of the Border and its inhabitants. In practice, their governments (both Scottish and English) used them as agents to contain, embarrass and spy on the other side. While the ruling monarchs no doubt wished their border subjects well or at least no harm, they were perfectly ready to sacrifice them in a greater cause.

Never lacking for enemies on both sides of the border, the Wardens held their lives in their hands in a society where there was much popular support for the view that the best kind of lawman was a dead one. Their fortunes also were under constant threat of possible Royal displeasure. In spite of this they did their job, some better than others. Some were in the office for what they could get out of it, while others were motivated by the ideals of the service. Though most of them fell somewhere in between. If there was justice on the frontier at all, it was because they made it.

During the time period that we portray, the following men held the Wardenships of the Marches.



To all goodly folk of St. Andrews, a missive from Chieftain Heber MacPhearson...

I wanted to take a few lines in the parchment to remind members of a few things about the daily lives going on within the Wicked Aye.

Firstly please remember that the tavern is an active stage within the guild camp set up. That means that there are gigs going on and that patrons are watching us. While something may not appear to be a gig, you never know. So make sure to not jump into interactions until you are certain that you will not be throwing off some one class gig.

The other thing to remember is that the patrons are watching us and therefore things going on within the confines of the tavern perimeter need to be period just like if they were going on in court. So when you come to the tavern with food and drink you need to make sure that you have a period plate or bowl to gat from, period utensils to gat with and a period drinking vessel. These are not items that the tavern will keep in stock so I would recommend a visit to one of the wonderful vendors about the shire to purchase some of these thing's, I know that bady flice generally has a goodly stock of period appropriate items.

Lastly I want to remind everyone with the upcoming season almost upon us, please do not forget the viands table. Remember that we need pickles, olives, nuts, dried and fresh fruits, gator aide, hard boiled eggs, fresh veggies and the like. Please make sure that all is cut up and ready to serve. This makes it better for all involved the less handling at faire the better.

#### cs The Legend of the Wild bunt &

#### Good Morrow All!

The Irish Mercenaries did have a most wondrous holiday season, and our time spent with family and friends, but now we are eagerly looking forward to seeing our goodly friends in St. Andrews. It looks as if the Queen's progress this year will be quite busy, especially at the end of the summer, but that gives us more time with all of you.

With the new season beginning, we are looking for new recruits. If any of you come across some likely prospects, folk who would like to join us as mercenaries or just join a rowdy camp of fighting folk in service to ther Majesty, then please do send them our way. They will be joining the Company of the Wild flunt.

The Wild flunt is a legend originating in the northern European countries, including Ireland, Scotland, Germany and England. Below are several quotes relating to the legends of the Wild flunt from various sources.

"When the winter winds blow and the Yule fires are lit, from the north of Scandinavia down to Switzerland, it is best to stay indoors, safely shut away from the dark forest paths and the wild heaths. Those who wander out by themselves during the Yule-nights may hear a sudden rustling through the tops of the trees -- a rustling that might be the wind, though the rest of the wood is still. But then the barking of dogs fills the air, with the hunters behind whooping "Wod! Wod!" a man's voice cries from above, "Midden in dem Weg!" and the host of wild souls sweeps down, fire flashing from the eyes of the black hounds and hooves of the black horses.

The wise traveller falls down at once in the middle of the road, face down. If he is lucky, he will take no harm other than the cold feet of the black dogs running over his body. More foolish folk are swept up, coming to earth far from home or left dead behind the furious host." (1)

The Wild Hunt is ... a force of good that the Celtic gods use to chase evil beings from their lands. It is said to be a great pack of wolflike hunting hounds, led by a great huntsman with an antigred helmet. But there are other tales of the Wild Hunt, from other cultures. In some primes, the Hunt is known as a force of evil, the huntsmen being death gods who lost their worship, but did not die, joining the hunt to take out their anger on the world. In such places, the hunt is said to be lead by a great monster of a man, with antigrs growing from his head, and the hounds of the Hunt are great beasts with eyes of fire, whipped on by the huntsmen.

So which is the Hunt? A force of good or of evil? Is it exclusively a Celtic phenomenon, and have enemies of Celtic cultures created stories of the evil Hunt as propaganda? Or have the Celtic gods allied themselves with a force of evil, to better hunt other evil? The true answer is: none of the above. The Wild Hunt is neither good nor evil. It is purest neutral, indeed representing the force of the hunt and chase within nature.

The Wild flunt exists for the chase. It is capable of following its prey though any environment, from the densest jungles, to the deepest deserts, even across the sea... The flunt is tireless, hounding prey until they catch it. And the hounds of the flunt seem to never lose the seent, being able to track over solid stone, or running water, or any other substance. Indeed, the hounds are capable of tracking even beings that should not leave a scent, like spectres or beings of energy." (2)

"During the furious storms of midwinter, the country peoples of Britain and Northern Curope, especially France and Germany, would cower in their homes when above the tumult of the gale could be heard the sound of hunting horn and the pounding of hooves, accompanied by the dreadful baying of hounds ...

Those unlucky enough to be outside in the forest were sometimes afforded a glimpse of a macabre company of huge, black horses, ridden by ghosts on the very air, with monstrous, howling black dogs alongside; dogs with red eyes large as saucers, or perhaps, even with human heads. This retinue would be led by a grim and fearsome spectre in the robes of a king, jet-black as the rest, and crowned with antlers.

This was the Wild flunt." (3)

"Simply put, the Wild Hunt (or wilde lagd) is a procession of beings led by a spirit who roam through the countryside reveling, hunting, killing or gating everything in their path. The name of the leader of the Hunt varies from place to place, and strangely enough the leader was normally a woman, a dgity. The most common name was Perchta or Hulda, which was put down by Latin authors as Diana or Herodias".(4)

"Seging the Wild flunt was thought to presage some catastrophe such as war or plague, or at best the death of the one who witnessed it. Mortals getting in the path of or following the Hunt could be kidnapped and brought to the land of the dead.

In many Scandinavian and German versions, the hunt is often for a woman, who is captured or killed. The hunter may be an unidentified lost soul, or he may a historical or legendary figure" (5)

As ther Majesty's Mercenaries, we hope to be that haunting spectre searching out her enemies, to be that catastrophy that haunts them. But we also plan to honor the reveling part as well. Because of that we hope to attract those to our eamp who wish to support our mercenaries as they serve our good Queen in the defense of Scotland against her enemies.

#### C3 Bir William Maitland 80

Sir William Maitland, born in 1528, was the eldest son of Sir Richard Maitland. He was an accomplished scholar at the University of St. Andrew's and studied civil law. He was considered a man of power: sagacious, versatile, intelligent and unscrupulous.

the had many positions in the Scottish Government. In 1558, prior to Mary, Queen of Scots return to Scotland, Maitland entered into the service of the Queen Regent and was appointed Secretary of State. In 1560 he was chosen 'Harangue-Maker' or speaker of Parliament. In 1561 he was made the Lord of Session to Lethington, Earl of Lethington and Thirlestane and became a member of the Privy Council. In 1562 he was appointed Keeper of the Great Seal of Scotland, and an Extraordinary Lord to Parliament. In 1566 he was made Ordinary Lord of Session.

this overriding aim was to unite England and Scotland by securing Mary Stuart as Elizabeth I's successor. To further that aim: he negotiated the Treaty of Berwick between England and the Duc of Chatelherault, which agreed to act jointly to expel the French from Scotland in 1560; he was part of the conspiracy against David Rizzio, her majesty's secretary & friend; was known to have signed the bond for preparation of the murder of Henry Stuart, Lord Darnley & King Consort; and he was opposed the queen's marriage to Lord Bothwell.

Maitland accompanied the queen in her expedition to the North against George Gordon, the Earl of Huntley. He was present at the Battle of Corriche, where he denounced Knox and recited a prayer before the battle saying they should find favor with God against the multitudes of Mary's troops.

William married Mary Fleming, one of the Queen's four Mary's. She bore him a son who was named James Maitland. After the capture of the Queen, Maitland took a stronghold in one of her castles. He was eventually captured and placed in an English prison, being labeled a rebel against the crown, where he eventually, in 1573, took his own life.



#### CA A Missive from the Assistant Guild Master &

I am sure that by now everyone has heard that that this Grace, Sir Drew has appointed me to the position of Assistant Guild Master. I am honored that he chose me to fill this position of honor. 


